



YOUR FAITH/INTERFAITH GROUP AND HOLOCAUST **MEMORIAL DAY 2014**

Faith and interfaith organisations play a fundamental role in fostering understanding and good relationships between different faith groups in the UK. Marking HMD is an opportunity for people of all faiths and none to come together to celebrate the diversity of their communities, challenge prejudice and intolerance and create a safer, better future. This factsheet has guidance on how your faith or interfaith group can mark 27 January.

Holocaust Memorial Day 2014 – Journeys

On Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) – 27 January we challenge hatred and persecution in the UK by sharing the memory of the millions who have been murdered in the Holocaust, Nazi Persecution and subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

The experience of those affected by genocide is characterised by forced **Journeys**. For HMD 2014, we will learn of the multitude of **Journeys** that people were forced to undertake because of genocide, in fear of what would be found at the end. We will do so at events that bring us together with our neighbours, strengthen bonds of respect, and enable us to pledge to take a **step** to create a safer, better future.

HMD is a really important reminder for all people, regardless of their faith or belief. To say that the Holocaust was a tragedy is a gross understatement. It was a moment when humanity lost its humanity. And yet genocides and mass killings continue in our world and hatred and prejudice are all too common. We must - all of us - resolve to learn the lessons of the past in order to build a better, more peaceful, future

Faith / interfaith groups, the Holocaust and the subsequent genocides

HMD has a unique significance for faith and interfaith groups. During the Holocaust, Nazi Persecution and in subsequent genocides individuals and groups were targeted simply because of their differing beliefs and identities. The Holocaust was a campaign to murder European Jewry in its entirety. During the 1990s war in Bosnia, extremist Bosnian Serbs promoted hatred of Muslims and murdered over 8,000 Muslim men and boys in Srebrenica. By reflecting on the impact of these atrocities on different faith communities we can work towards challenging hatred and discrimination in the UK today.

The Holocaust and other genocides also offer many examples of individuals reaching out to people of different faiths, offering them protection and assistance at great personal risk. These stories show the human capacity for good in the face of evil.

How can your faith / interfaith group mark **Holocaust Memorial Day 2014?** For HMD 2014, you could:

- Enjoy a shared meal sharing traditional dishes from other religions or cultures is a great way to bring people from different communities together.
- Organise a faith or interfaith ceremony you could include readings from religious texts, poetry, prayers, hymns or songs.
- Hold a discussion discussion can evoke fruitful ideas as well as encouraging greater mutual understanding for those involved.
- You could also invite other community groups. the police, local politicians and the general public to your event.

Things to consider

- The first consideration is religious days. The Jewish Shabbat lasts from Friday evening until Saturday evening and the Islamic Jumu'ah prayer is on Friday. Sunday is the religious day for Christians. Depending upon your audience, a day on which there are no conflicts with significant religious days might be the most appropriate for HMD commemoration.
- In identifying a room or space where the activity can be held, it is important to be respectful to all faiths, so activities could be held in a neutral space.

Just about every faith has its own version of what is called 'The Golden Rule'. Judgism has it in the text of Leviticus 19:18 - 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' A first century rabbi called Hillel' said that the essence of all Jewish teaching was the phrase, 'what is hateful to you, do not do to another.' When Jews'talk of the Holocaust, they say 'never again'. Let us be very clear, we mean 'never again to anyone of any faith, race, or nationality.' To make this real, we must build bridges between faiths, races, sexuality and nationalities because, ultimately, we are all human.
